Marina Matters

The Tuesday Working Group has made excellent progress on annual deck maintenance on A Finger. This includes board flipping and treatment of sub-deck structures.

The Marina Committee is pleased to announce that after an exhaustive process a preferred supplier has been selected for the Pedestal Replacement Program. The new pedestals will be manufactured and installed by local company Goolwa Masts and Welding. The Pedestals have been specifically designed for the GRYC and constructed of robust aluminium housing dual power outlets, water and lighting services. A pedestal will be installed in the near future for a short trial period to test lighting options. After the completion of the trial, new pedestals will be progressively installed starting with those that are in the poorest condition.

The Marina Committee for 2017/18 comprises: Louise Edwards (Chair), Steve West, Andrew Robertson, David Hurford, Ian Powrie, Peter Gibberd and Lloyd Goudge. Please feel free to discuss any issues or ideas you have with any member of the Marina Committee.

It has been brought to our attention that a number of electrical lines are rather precariously run from the service pedestals to boats. Can you please check your electrical lines and ensure that they do not constitute a trip hazard and are not in contact with the water?

This is the fastest and most reliable way of getting mooring lines, lights and other minor maintenance issues addressed.



Shambles

Shambles (named after the Shambles Light in UK) is a John Swarbrick design built in 1979 and intended for JOG racing (short offshore races). I have owned it since 2000. Under the old



IOR rule it rated as a "mini-tonner". LOA 6.7m, beam 2m and it draws 1.3m. Weight is a little over 1000kg. The hull is foam sandwich with a balsa cored deck. The drop keel is a stainless steel fabrication filled with lead shot. The mast is alloy sleeved to the spreaders. The rig is single spreader with diamonds to support the upper section. Sail areas - main 14 sq m, no.1 Genoa 12 sq m and fractional spinnaker 26 sq m. We have recently fitted a bowsprit with the intention of trying asymmetric spinnakers. (nice job thanks Randal).

We have raced her on the Noosa River, Sydney Harbour, Yamba and the south and east coasts of UK. Race highlights include a division win in the Bay to Bay race (Tin Can Bay to Hervey Bay). The picture is of *Shambles* racing on the Noosa River.

The Wylo (willow) story so far

Liz and I went to the Tasmanian Wooden Boat Festival in 2013 to buy a wooden boat to sail around Goolwa and the lakes, preferably a yacht already restored and in going condition. Instead I bought a wreck from The Garden Island Sailing Club built in 1929 when all decisions were based on the length of the foot of the owner's wife, but that's another story.

We trucked the wreck down to Goolwa, pulled it up into the big shed at Captain Sturt Marina and I removed the lead keel and dead wood, Harry (our son) cut the rotten cabin off and together we pulled up the decks.

Next I removed the engine and then we rolled the hull over and sanded and sanded and sanded until all 84 years worth of paint and antifoul were removed and then we waited for the timber to dry out enough to epoxy glass the whole hull.

Mean time I purchased *Hoodlum* and rerigged it just to fill in some time and a gap in boats that I owned.

About this time I moved back into the sheds at Gardiner Street that I had built 10 years earlier and we glassed, faired and primed *Wylo's* hull. Next Paul Harvey and I worked on the decks and cabin and made the cockpit longer; I know hard to believe it was 900mm shorter.

While this was going on I sold *Hoodlum* and bought *Zealot*, now named *The Calm* which is my new racing attitude. Then came the 2015 Tassie Wooden Boat Festival, Pt. Lincoln Race Week, European vacation and, sorry, business trip, so work on *Wylo* slowed for a while. After the 2017 Wooden Boat Festival in Tassie I made the brave announcement that we would be sailing at The South Australian Wooden Boat Festival at Goolwa in 2017. So with the help of our shipwrights Grant and Ronnie and Harry we pulled this off. She looks stunning and the first time Paul and I

sailed her all the right numbers came up on the smart phone.

With cracking starts, no spinnaker and the spare sails borrowed off my 21 Nerana, we won both races at the Festival over the line and the Neil Shaw Trophy. Lucky it was very light breezes, as we were under-ballasted but now carry close to a tonne of internal lead ingots. Full credit for the event to my crew Liz and Paul and to all the crew we have had so far; thank you.

This is the 11th yacht to carry the name *Wylo* – old English or Welsh for 'a girl of the forest', a boy of the forest is spelt Willow; this can all be learned from old black and white movies. The owner had 13 yachts of the same name with number 12 owned by a past GRYC member in Qld.
